

Tina introduced the fabulously adorable, Sooner Seniorettes and asked if they had enjoyed their muffins this morning. She passed out muffins to those that hadn't had one. She thanked them and said their sweet smiles brighten our day!

If anyone has any reimbursements, please see Margaret today since the books have to be closed by April 1st.

They sold on the spot so she ended up selling all directories this year. 
Convention is nearly here and I think I MIGHT be ready.

BOO BOO BUNNY

Turn a frown upside down by transforming an ordinary washcloth into a cuddly toy bunny. What a great philanthropic project for a children's hospital or a kindergarten class in a disadvantaged school. Or use as a Ways & Means project and sell at a bazaar. Have fun!



What you'll need

- Washcloth (a baby washcloth works especially well)
- Rubber band
- Glue
- Googly eyes
- Small pom-pom
- Large pom-pom
- Ribbon to tie around bunny's neck

Helpful Tip:

Designed with a hole in its center, the bunny slips onto a fingertip for an instant puppet show, or you can quickly pop it over an ice cube to help soothe an unexpected bump or scratch.

How to make it



1.

First, place the washcloth on a tabletop and evenly roll two diagonally opposite corners toward the middle. Fold the rolled washcloth in half.



Fold the cloth in half a second time and wrap the rubber band around the second fold to form the bunny's head. Gently pull apart the rolled ends that extend above the rubber band so that they resemble rabbit ears.

Next, glue the googly eyes onto the face and the small pom-pom in place for a nose. Glue the large pom-pom onto the back of the original fold to serve as a cottony tail, and the bunny is finished.

The Runaway Bunny


Once there was a little bunny who wanted to run away. So he said to his mother, "I am running away." "If you run away," said his mother, "I will run after you. For you are my little bunny."

"If you become a tightrope walker and walk across the air," said the bunny, "I will become a little boy and run into a house."


"If you become a little boy and run into a house," said the mother bunny, "I will become your mother and catch you in my arms and hug you."
