How to plan your very own Cookin' for the Kids event Submitted By: Donna Shook ESA for St Jude Chairman

(Note: this event is modeled after the Food Network show "Chopped!" - check it out!

Chopped is an American reality based cooking television series that pits four chefs against each other competing for a chance to win \$10,000.

In each episode, four chefs compete. Their challenge is to take a mystery basket of ingredients and turn them into a dish that is judged on their creativity, presentation, and taste with minimal time to plan and execute.^{[1][2]} The show is divided into three rounds: "Appetizer", "Entrée", and "Dessert". In each round, the chefs are given a basket containing between three and five (usually four) ingredients, and the dish each competitor prepares must contain each of those ingredients. The ingredients are often ones which are not commonly prepared together. For example, in "Yucca, Watermelon, Tortillas," the episode which originally aired on February 10, 2009, the appetizer course baskets contained watermelon, canned sardines, pepper jack cheese, and zucchini. The competitors are given access to a pantry and refrigerator stocked with a wide variety of other ingredients. Each round has a time limit. After each round, the judges critique the dishes based on presentation, taste, and creativity. The judges then decide which chef is "chopped," that is, eliminated from the competition. Thus, by the dessert round, only two chefs remain. When deciding the winner, the judges consider not only the dessert course, but the entire meal presented by each chef as a whole.)

- First, get in touch with the hotel (if you are holding this event at a hotel) to make sure you are allowed to bring in outside food. Many hotels have rules against this. If they will allow outside food, be sure that you are able to use electric griddles, hot plates, etc. (if you choose to use them)
- Once you decide to hold the event you will need to find the chefs. If you are holding this as a state-wide event, you can ask each region to choose one or two chefs to compete. If you are holding this on a smaller scale you can ask for volunteers. You should have one or two chefs per team.
- Ask the chefs to go to local businesses, friends and family to get donations in their name for the event. The team that raises the most money will win a prize. Make sure all checks are made out to St. Jude!
- Decide what you want to have as the "surprise ingredients" that will be revealed at the time of the event. You will want to use at least one ingredient that is out of the ordinary. At the first Cookin' for the Kids event in Kansas the ingredients were chicken breast, purple cabbage, canned cranberry sauce and animal crackers. Get creative!

How to plan your very own Cookin' for the Kids event

- You will need to put together a pantry of additional items for the cooks to use to complete their meals. Things
 like spices, oils, mustards, sugar, fruits and veggies would all be good.
- Select your judges. It would be great to include local heroes (police or firefighters), members of the media (reporters could write up a story for your local paper), or ALSAC/St. Jude folks.
- Brush up on your ESA and St. Jude information! During the event while the chefs are cooking someone will need to emcee. They can share information about ESA and St. Jude, the partnership, favorite memories, etc.
 Ask each judge and chef to put together a bio that can also be read during the event.
- Want to kick it up a notch? Ask each team, member, region, etc. to decorate an apron. Attendees can vote
 on their favorite apron and the people who made it can get a prize. You can also auction the apron off for
 more money for the hospital!
- Place a small gift bag in in front of the table of each of the cooks. Encourage attendees to make additional donation in the bags of the team they are rooting for.
- Want to make this a membership event? Ask each chef to partner with a perspective member. What better way to show them how much fun we have in ESA!
- Each dish will be judged on taste, presentation and creativity.
- Announce the winners, along with the amount raised, and hand out the prizes!
- Any leftover food can be donated to a local shelter.


