Merry Christmas and Happy New Year Sisters!

I can't believe it's already time for the holidays. I hope everyone has been enjoying (as well as sharing ©) the music educationals so far this year. I also hope that you've been having fun with your own. I look forward to reading and learning all about them!

Remember, April 1st will be here before we know it, so get out there and have some fun sharing the gift of music with ESA!

Here's an interesting educational that I presented in October at the Oklahoma School for the Deaf. I hope you enjoy it.

IS MUSIC POSSIBLE WHEN YOU'RE DEAF?

Can deaf people hear music? Of course they can't hear it the same way you or I can that have hearing. Their way of hearing is through the feeling of vibrations.

Vibrations have rhythm when produced by music. The rhythm of the drum beat, and sometimes the bass, can be felt. At a live marching band show, for instance, you can feel the tuba horns and when an airplane flies low, a deaf person can feel the vibrations and know even on a cloudy day, what it is. It has been said that a deaf person could identify which vibrations were produced by the drum and which were the bass.

Deaf people sense vibration in the part of the brain that other people use for hearing – which helps explain how deaf musicians can sense music, and how they can enjoy concerts and other musical events.

The experience deaf people have when "feeling" music is similar to the experience other people have when hearing music. The perception of the musical vibrations by the deaf is likely every bit as real as the equivalent sounds, since they are ultimately processed in the same part of the brain used for hearing.

It's common for someone who has lost one of the main senses to highly develop other senses to compensate. So it appears that deaf people have become more sensitive to the vibrations they feel and the brain translates it as it would have if they had heard it.

Not only can they feel vibrations, they can also play instruments. They're able to learn music theory as long as you tap the rhythm out. That way they are able to read music.

Each deaf person has a different level of hearing loss so some can hear higher pitched sounds and other lower pitched sounds. Many can hear certain pitches of music, but not understand the lyrics. Others have hearing aids that permit them to hear music.

Deaf people take the lyrics of a son seriously. Each word is linked with a note, tone, and emotion. When the song is translated into sign language, it has even more meaning. Music has a powerful influence on the emotions, and perhaps no one understands that better than the deaf. Thy lyrics express feelings & thoughts that, when combined with music, touch the heart. Hearing people use music as an escape and so do deaf people.

A hearing person may take for granted the visual effects of music. The deaf person sees the performance, the reaction of other listeners, the story portrayed in music videos, and, if it is translated into sign language, the meaning of the lyrics. These visual stimuli are received in the hearing part of the brain as with the vibrations.

Music is more than just rhythm and melody. The vibrations, visual effects, emotional import of the lyrics, and yes, the music itself are all part of how deaf people enjoy the music experience. Many deaf persons have become successful musicians. Being deaf is not a hindrance to enjoying or for that matter playing music.
