Saturday, April 30, 2016 First General Assembly Minutes

Tietje German, Corresponding Secretary, called for seating at 7:50 a.m.

Lola Jaegers, Sooner Seniorette, conducted the Opening Flag Ceremony.

Oklahoma State Council President Billye Peterson declared the 73rd Annual OK State Convention of ESA International in session at 8:30 a.m.

Dr. Peterson led the membership in the Opening Ritual.

A devotional was offered by Peggy Hughes, Chaplain.

Robbin Brown, Convention Chair and Sooner Seniorette, welcomed the attendees to the convention. Robbin then introduced Sheraton Hotel Director of Sales, Tammy McDaniel. Ms. McDaniel thanked the membership for coming to the Sheraton for the weekend. Ms. McDaniel informed the group that she and her staff were available to meet the needs of the attendees during their stay and were looking forward to seeing that ESA has a memorable weekend.

Did you know that happy people are healthier people? We started the year off with a "bang". If you missed the June State Council meeting you missed an informative and fun meeting. There were some additions to the Foundation Contest rules.

"The contest now states: Total money donated excluding the turn around fund; total money donated through the turn around Fund. Information from ESA Foundation monthly report from the Foundation office. (See Summary of Contest, Guidelines) We voted to add: Valve of Monetary Donations and donations not sent directly to Foundation will be counted; information will be taken from service report."

We also voted to add a Standing Rule #10, which states:

All monies raised during the State Convention Auction to Benefit St. Jude, Easter Seals and the ESA Foundation will be divided equally between the three projects. After all funds are collected the Foundation Counselor will send the entire monetary amount and the paper work to ESA Foundation Headquarters. Eligible donations will be sent through the Turn Around Fund.

The ESA Foundation Registered Agent will send the appropriate distribution of the donation allotment, for St. Jude, to the ESA For St. Jude Office at ESA Headquarters.

A check will be sent to the State Easter Seals Chairman from the Foundation Turn Around Fund and the State Easter Seal chairman will send that check to Easter Seals of Oklahoma.

The Foundation's portion of the funds will be placed in the Foundation area designated by the Oklahoma ESA Foundation Counselor. This will be a direct donation of the designated funds because donations by ESA entities to the ESA Foundation cannot be sent through the Turn Around Fund.

How a designated area for the Foundation donation is chosen:

First the Counselor will make sure the Endowments under the supervision of the Oklahoma State Council have enough funds to give scholarships. If not the monies will be divided between those Endowments. If the endowments are viable then the funds may be contributed to other fund raising areas of the Foundation. Such as the Fantasy Event, The General Fund, The Art Spark Grant, that honors BJ Clark, or sponsor events held during the Foundation Fund Fest at IC Convention.

We also voted to combine two of the Endowments that the Oklahoma State Council is responsible for as we did a few years ago. Hawkins and Monty Tuma were combined. Myre Starr and Hawkins-Tuma are the two to be combined. This will give the endowment more money to give a larger scholarship, because one of the \$5000 restricted fund will be added to the scholarship. All of the names will be added to the scholarship.

Other Endowments Oklahoma State Council is responsible for funding:

Mary Louise Smith, has \$276,177 including the \$5000 restricted fund; Dorothy Smith-Drumm \$18,416.83 and Oscar and Joyce Whitewing \$17,152; Hawkins-Tuma \$7,455; Myre Starr \$6,974. That means that we depend on your donations to fund these endowments to keep them going.

It's almost scholarship time. I need everyone's help in getting the word out about the ESA Foundation Scholarships. Any high school graduate; college student or college grad; and even you can apply for a scholarship. Tell your friends, neighbors, family members, put it in your church bulletin, posters up at work any way you can think of getting the message out. The scholarships are available October first. Go on line



Those who apply not only complete an application, they must also write a letter explaining how the device would impact the recipient, as well as sit through a personal interview before being selected. Easterseals directly purchase the requested device(s) and then present it to the selected individual(s). However, this is not a funded service. Therefore, they have not been able to assist nearly as many as desired in recent years. Your support and fundraising will make such a difference in the lives of those applying for this assistance. Start your collection jars now and send me pictures to update others on your chapter's ESA for ESOK goal. Looking forward to seeing how many individuals' lives will be impacted this year through our partnership!

JOURNEY TO St. Jude Children's Research Hospital By Jane Thomas

On March 1, members of the Delta Lambda chapter of ESA held their monthly meeting in the home of Jane Thomas. We enjoyed a covered dish dinner and were treated to an informative educational by our adopted O S B student, Tai Yauri Thomas. Other guests on this occasion included her school friend Richelle Zampella and their creative writing teacher, Kathy Barrett.

Tai Yauri is a St. Jude's patient, and travels there with her mom every six months for a precautionary check-up because of a tumor still present behind her right eye. Here is her story.

Tai Yauri first was taken to St. Jude's when she was 14 months old.

To aid in her presentation, she had recorded a conversation with her Mom, who lives in Oklahoma City. This summary represents the combination of Tai Yauri's remarks, those in the recording, and a conversation which I had with her mother following our meeting.

Mom noticed that when she put Tai Yauri (whom we call Tai) to bed in a darkened room, she could see the reflection of the hall way light in Tai's eyes, (like cat eyes). Recognizing that this was not normal, she immediately contacted her local doctor, who arrnged for Tai to be seen in Oklahoma City. The result of that visit was that the Oklahoma City doctors wanted to immediately remove both eyes, leaving Tai totally blind from a cancer called Retinoblastoma. Meanwhile, her mom confided these developments with an attorney whom she believed to be credible in many ways. The attorney told her, amazingly, that her own daughter had suffered from this same condition, and had beaten this cancer by receiving treatments at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis. Her final admonition to Mom was, "get Tai to St. Jude's." And that was exactly what she did.

Tai had to receive numerous rounds of chemo and radiation, and did lose her right eye. But, the doctors at St. Jude's were able to save some vision in her left eye, which she still has today.

Saving the vision in Tai's left eye enabled her to follow the interests of her athletic personality, as a young child. She learned to ride a bicycle, and played some basketball and football. Her mom recognized the need for Tai to come to our school after the third grade. Tai had often resisted the way in which classroom aids in public school wanted to hover over her, as her interest was to aggressively run and play.

At O S B, Tai found the freedom to explore her athletic personality, and to be with many others also experiencing low vision.

Both Tai and her mom spoke about the generosity of St. Jude's, providing free transportation, food and lodging for both of them for extended stays, and for regular checkups.

They were also able to bond with other families when Tai was small, and receiving frequent treatments. Another development which Mom remembered fondly, was the fact that Tai's first prosthesis was made by the same ocularist who made them regularly for Sammy Davis Junior. Now, his son has taken his place, doing fine work, at no cost to the family.

Tai is a bright and talented young girl, whose life has been shaped in many ways by the wisdom and compassion of a host of doctors and staff at St. Jude's Children's hospital.



ESA's Care Connection is a link that provides service to members, their families, and others whom they recommend for assistance. The program was created solely to facilitate the exchange of person-to-person charitable services. Members share their personal talents and caring spirit to provide support to other ESA members. Simply put, Care Connection provides an opportunity for members to help others, as well as to receive assistance during their own times of need.

Care Connection utilizes the knowledge, expertise, and volunteer skills of ESA members to share support and service to others during times of change, transition, or personal crisis.

Through Care Connection, ESA members have channeled both financial and personal support to individuals, and sometimes to the communities of our membership, when emergencies arise.

For instance, following Hurricane Katrina, Care Connection harnessed the efforts of ESA members everywhere to provide material goods, and, in some cases, financial aid and personal assistance to those members whose lives were disrupted by the storm.

Most often, Care Connection meets the personal needs of members who want or need information regarding support for relatives or family members living at a distance, exchange of business opportunities or information, or to send expressions of support or good wishes to members who are celebrating joyful times or experiencing personal crises (via cards, letters, e-mails, tweets, calling trees, etc.)

Care Connection also helps members connect during times of transition when they are seeking support of their ESA family as they move, or as their personal circumstances change. This type of relocation information is often invaluable to members who are contemplating a move, change in career, or other life-altering transition.



This year, as part of ESA's "Fun for All Ages" focus project, members and chapters are encouraged to host a walk/run event to support a cause you love and meet people of all ages you can invite to join ESA. Do one sometime in the year for any good cause, and create it specifically to appeal as a "Fun for All Ages" event – reach out to families with school-aged children, young adults, active seniors, congregational organizations, and business community partners to offer them a great time for all their people while making your community a better place.

Some ideas:

- 5K promote to runners' clubs and high school runners
- Nighttime "Glow" event Host an "after dark" walk/run showcasing glow sticks and necklaces, Neon shirts, light up props, late night food/fun
- Parade-style (decorate your wagon, stroller, board, bike) kids and families walking laps around the high school track, park or ballfield with fun after-events on the center field.
- Try one in September for St. Jude if you want to do a "walk" event and one of the ALSAC walk sites is not near you (see below for more info about St. Jude walk events)
- If you envision something big, we have "how to" event tips from members who have done these larger 5K style events (tip: start planning these well in advance)
- Have members ready to talk about ESA good works in the community and to invite attendees to join ESA

DO SOME GOOD

There are lots of ways to use your Fun for All Ages walk/run event to do some good. Contact the charity/cause you're supporting and discuss a need you'd like to help them fill. You can choose to raise general fund cash donations, or to help them achieve a more specific goal, like helping purchase a big ticket item on the charity's wish list such (playground equipment for the shelter's backyard and so on). Or choose to do some good through non-cash donations, like asking walk participants bringing food for the pantry, a coat/hats/boots for the Veterans' Services Outreach Center, or baby clothes and supplies for struggling single moms.

MAKE THE "AFTER-PARTY" FABULOUS!

Give everyone a reason to stick around after the walk/run activities conclude. Your real opportunity to mingle with the participants might be AFTER the walk/run, so create some fun activities for participants as they finish the main event:

- Food
- Prize drawings
- Costume contests/prizes
- Karaoke/prizes
- Photo booths, local celebrity photos
- Lawn games (corn hole/bean bags)
- Face painting, balloon animals
- Thank you from guest speakers (especially if it's for a cause) local media, people who've been helped by the cause, staffers from your cause
- Big Check presentation

WHO TO INVITE

Three groups of people can be targeted as participants for your event. Think about who would enjoy the event itself and the activities of the day you have planned.

- 1. People who will especially enjoy the walk/run itself. If you're planning a 5K, these are the local runners' clubs, high school and university track team members, staffers and members of local health clubs who should be on your guest list and the targets of your promotional activities. If you're planning a parade-style walk with decorated bicycles/wagons/skateboards and face painters, try inviting young families through daycare facilities, elementary school PTOs, neighborhood homeowners' organizations, or congregational groups.
- 2. People who love the cause and will turn out specifically to support that cause. The charity or organization you are supporting keeps a donors/supporters list and is usually generous in sharing it when for an event that benefits their cause. This is a great source for your participant invitation list and also of business contacts for donations. The charity staffers may even be willing to make some calls or provide you with a letter to reach out to their supporters.
- 3. Business and community organizations, their members and staffers. These are people who you are asking to donate to your event and would probably LOVE to bring some of their people along. For example, encourage the owner of the car dealership that is donating all the sodas to bring their own family, friends, and customers to enjoy the good work their dealership is doing in the community through supporting your event.

PROMOTE THE EVENT

- 1. You'll want to design promotions aimed at each of your target invitee groups. Creating fliers to post in places frequented by these groups, like in running shoe stores for your 5K and in daycare centers or in the children's library room for your parade-style walk help you target those members of the public you think will especially enjoy the event and activities of the day. Speak with the staff at places like this so they can get excited about the event and help with word of mouth support, directing interested people to your registration information.
- 2. For contacting donors/supporters of the cause, find out if the charity will allow you to send an e-mail from their account about your event and post content on their social media pages and in their newsletters. In addition, request permission to attend other events of the charity and pass out information about your upcoming event. Their most ardent supporters often turn out for many events for the cause in the area.
- 3. For YOUR donors and supporters, design some promotional materials they can proudly display at their business about the event recognizing them as a sponsor in order to make it easy for them to showcase their good works to their customers AND to invite customers to join in this fabulous event being supported by the business.

DONATIONS

- Cash donations from businesses to sponsor the needed event supplies (recognize their business as a sponsor at your registration table, on the shirts, on the signs, in the ads) a great way raise the money to order shirts, banners, and other advance needs
- In-Kind donations of food, beverages, signage/printing, and prizes; donation of services like face painting and photography
- Additional volunteers for course marshals, emcees
- Donation of facilities' use
- You can even layer on some extra bucks by turning some of your donated prizes into raffle items or selling some of the donated food items.

TALK ABOUT ESA

These walks have the dual purpose of meeting and welcoming new members of all ages as well as supporting your event and cause, and BOTH are equally important. Put your best foot forward to showcase ESA. Plan some time in your "stick-around-afterwards" activities to address the crowd, thank them for their support, and tell a little about ESA. Briefly mention some of ESA's national causes your chapter supports, other local groups you help, and that chapters in your area are welcoming new members **right now**, so anyone who is interested in more fun opportunities for volunteerism should see someone in an ESA shirt or visit your table for more information.
