
The main change, if you are reading this to the end, is that the location and dates for the 20-21 Convention has changed.



Mary Edwards Walker

Mary Edwards Walker was born in the <u>Town of Oswego</u>, New York, on November 26, 1832. She was the youngest of seven children: she had five sisters and one brother. Their nontraditional parenting nurtured Mary's spirit of independence and sense of justice that she actively demonstrated throughout her life. While they were devoted Christians, the Walkers were "free thinkers" who raised their children to question the regulations and restrictions of various denominations. The Walker parents also demonstrated non-traditional gender roles to their children regarding sharing work around the farm: Vesta often participated in heavy labor while Alvah took part in general household chores. Walker worked on her family farm as a child. She did not wear women's clothing during farm labor because she considered it too restricting. Her mother reinforced her views that corsets and tight lacings were unhealthy.

After finishing primary school, Mary and two of her older sisters attended Falley Seminary in Fulton, New York. Falley was not only an institution of higher learning, but a place that emphasized modern social reform in gender roles, education, and hygiene. Its ideologies and practices further cemented Mary's determination to defy traditional feminine standards on a principle of injustice. In her free time, Mary would pore over her father's medical texts on anatomy and physiology; her interest in medicine is attributable to her exposure to medical literature at an early age. As a young woman, she taught at a school in Minetto, New York, eventually earning enough money to pay her way through Syracuse Medical College, where she graduated with honors as a medical doctor in 1855, the only woman in her class.

Walker was infamous for contesting traditional female wardrobe. In 1871, she wrote, "The greatest sorrows from which women suffer to-day are those physical, moral, and mental ones, that are caused by their unhygienic manner of dressing!" She strongly opposed women's long skirts with numerous petticoats, not only for their discomfort and their inhibition to the wearer's mobility but for their collection and spread of dust and dirt. As a young woman, she began experimenting with various skirtlengths and layers, all with men's trousers underneath. By 1861, her typical ensemble included trousers with suspenders under a knee-length dress with a tight waist and full skirt.

Walker volunteered at the outbreak of American Civil War as a surgeon – first for the Army, but was rejected because she was a woman. The U.S. Army had no female surgeons, and at first, she was allowed to practice only as a nurse. During this period, she served at the First Battle of Bull Run (Manassas), July 21, 1861, and at the Patent Office Hospital in Washington, D.C. She worked as an unpaid field surgeon near the Union front lines, including at the Battle of Fredericksburg and in Chattanooga after the Battle of Chickamauga. As a suffragist, she was happy to see women serving as soldiers, and alerted the press to the case of Frances Hook, in Ward 2 of the Chattanooga hospital, a woman who served in the Union forces disguised as a man. Walker was the first female surgeon of the Union army. She wore men's clothing during her work, claiming it to be easier for high demands of her work.

On April 10, 1864, she was captured by Confederate troops, and arrested as a spy, just after she finished

helping a Confederate doctor perform an amputation. She was sent to Castle Thunder in Richmond,

Virginia, and remained there until August 12, 1864, when she was released as part of a prisoner exchange. While she was imprisoned, she refused to wear the clothes provided her, said to be more "becoming of her sex". Walker was exchanged for a Confederate surgeon from Tennessee on August 12, 1864.

She went on to serve as supervisor of a female prison in Louisville, Kentucky, and as the head of an orphanage in Tennessee.

After the war, Walker was awarded a disability pension for partial muscular atrophy suffered while she was imprisoned by the enemy. She was given \$8.50 a month, beginning June 13, 1865, but in 1899 that amount was raised to \$20 per month.

She became a writer and lecturer, supporting such issues as health care, temperance, women's rights, and dress reform for women. She was frequently arrested for wearing men's clothing, and insisted on her right to wear clothing that she thought appropriate. She wrote two books that discussed women's rights and dress. She replied to criticism of her attire: "I don't wear men's clothes, I wear my own clothes.

Walker was a member of the central woman's suffrage Bureau in Washington. She attempted to register to vote in 1871, but was turned away. The initial stance of the movement, following her lead, was to claim that women already had the right to vote, and Congress needed only to enact enabling legislation. She continued to attend suffrage conventions and distribute her own literature, but was virtually ignored by the rest of the movement.

In 1907, Walker published "Crowning Constitutional Argument", in which she argued that some States, as well as the federal Constitution, had already granted women the right to vote. She testified on women's suffrage before committees of the U.S. House of Representatives in 1912 and 1914. Her death in 1919 came one year before the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution, which guaranteed women the right to vote.

Walker felt that she had been awarded the Medal of Honor because she had gone into enemy territory to care for the suffering inhabitants, when no man had the courage to do so, for fear of being imprisoned.

Walker was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in 2000.

In keeping with Mona's theme this year "ESA Makes Beautiful Music," Mona introduced speaker Janet Fechnet from Bristow Schools, who spoke about her position with Bristow Schools, her faith in music impact on her students.

The next speaker was Eddie Quaid, Mona's brother, who spoke about his successes during his music teaching career. Following Eddie Quaid, Kappa Theta's Cheryl Tater, spoke about her continuing to work in the music ministry during the pandemic. Cheryl treated us to a song.

After Cheryl Tater, Mona introduced Cassidy Satterfield, St. Jude Rep who gave an update on St. Jude. Shaw Homes will be the builder for the Tulsa St. Jude Dream House as well as the Dream house in Oklahoma City for 2021. September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. Cassidy shared a video.

Mona introduced the Executive and General Board, and asked the Sooner Seniorettes to announce themselves.

We had one guest in attendance, Janet Fechnet and first time attendee, Carol King, Kappa Theta, Guthrie. Attendance will be taking via Zoom for the record.

Committee to read the minutes for this meeting are Rita Haines, Margaret Kramer and Sylvia Ochs.

2020 Convention Update – Robbin Brown/ Linda Leveridge: Robbin stated that we had 58 full registrations and 72 for the Saturday evening event. \$3,190.00 profit was made and \$1,095.25 was given to the State Council.

The committee to read the minutes from the First and Second General Assembly were Cathy Holstead, Chairman, Gwen Beasley and Gwynn Nell Swanson. Minutes were approved with one correction to the July 31st minutes.

The committee to read the March State Council meeting were Aletha Bolt, Sharon Storms and Darla Barton. Minutes were correct as printed.

First Vice President, Sandy Lackey announced the dates for the 2022 Convention, April 29th, 30th and May 1, 2022 at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Tulsa. Suite rates are King \$109, 2 doubles \$112. This includes made to order breakfast and a Manager's reception each evening. Convention registration is \$120 which includes the Friday night mixer. Hostess chapters are Alpha Theta and Beta Iota. Convention chair is Elise Jimison and Co-chair is Ruth Jo Carnegy.

Sandy asked everyone to think about serving on the state board, either elected or appointed. Nominating committee consists of Sandy Lackey, Linda Leverage, Margaret Kramer, Rita Hains, Jacque Cantrel and Gloria Torres. Please let them know in what capacity you are willing to serve.

Treasurer Marilyn Hight gave a Treasurer's update. Balance as of September 10, 2020 is \$4,174.39. We have \$4,000 in our CD and \$5,207.99 in the Money Market.

Directory Chair Lori Few reported that all 75 Directories have been sold.

Eastern District Coordinator/ Foundation Chair Judi York reported that the Eastern District Leadership meeting was held on August 22, 2020. Darlene Cushenberry, Kappa Alpha, Tulsa, volunteered to be the district's Vice Coordinator after the resignation of June Miller. The next Eastern District meeting will be February 27, 2021 in Muskogee.

Western District Coordinator, Ramona Bench announced the Western District Meeting will be October 10, 2020 at Noble Avenue Baptist Church, 1219 West Noble Avenue in Guthrie, Ok. Check in will be at 9:30 a.m. More information later.

2021 Convention Chair: Mona Johnston read for Tina McKamie. The 2021 ESA Oklahoma State convention will be held at the Crowne Plaza on April 30, 2021 and May 1, 2021. Registration will remain at \$120. The room rate will be \$99. Beta lota, Muskogee and Sigma Chi, Inola are hostess chapters.

Peggie Sprinkle, Membership Chair, announced that October is Recruitment month. The IC website has suggestions to go with the theme "Up Your Game in ESA".

Social Media/ Webmaster Aletha Bolt did a presentation about the Zoom process and protocol.

Care Connection/Hope for Heroes Chair, Jennifer Sparkman reported that the Tulsa area Blue Star moms are asking for 150 skull caps to be crocheted/ knitted by November 1st. The Tulsa Vet Center is requesting hats, scarves, quilts, and letters. In Oklahoma City the VA Health Care System announced in person volunteer opportunities are on hold. ESA Foundation:

Judi York International Vice Chairman reported that the ESA Foundation Board of Directors have been busy planning new things for ESA Foundation membership. The new Life Active Membership campaign is called "Smart Cookie", campaign.

As part of the 2020/2021 ESA Foundation Life Active campaign there is a special incentive for States. This is the Life Active Membership Grant Building Program. More information will be available in upcoming ESAF Workshops.

Rosalie Griffith, International ESAF Grant Chair, reported the results of the Foundation survey. Top choices were learning about ESA Foundation and Grants and Scholarships. Rosalie encouraged us to get the word out about available grants and scholarships through the Foundation. Applications have been low due to schools being out for COVID 19.

Vivian Gibson, ESA Foundation Counselor, thanked everyone who helped facilitate the Silent Auction at the State Convention in her absence. The auction raised \$1,561. Easterseals and St. Jude will receive \$520.33 each and the ESA Foundation will receive \$520.34. The foundation's portion was given to Hawkins, Tuma and Starr Endowment.

On Wednesday, September 30, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. the Foundation's first virtual workshop will be held. The topic is "Generosity—The Key to Happiness." To attend please send your email address to Judi York: Judikay@cox.net by Wednesday, September 23, 2020. Space is limited.

On October 17th at 6:30 p.m. ESA Foundation will present "Murder in Margaritaland" murder mystery party. Reservations must be made online: https://esa-foundation-event.square.site/. General admission entry is \$25 and sponsorships are tax deductible.

She received 5 names. Memberships go to Paula Willingham, Brenda Yates, Darla Barton, Beta Iota Chapter and Jeanne Kindley- Lipton. We have 3 remaining (\$75.00). We must use them before May 31, 2021.

- Jr. Past President/Disaster Fund Chair, Linda Leveridge requested that chapters consider doing more for the Disaster Fund this year. She has received two checks each for \$100.00. She would love to see each chapter in our state donate at least that amount as chapter budgets get planned.
- Sr. Past President/ Workshop Coordinator Margaret Kramer reported that the Finance committee appointed a Ways and Means Committee and agreed to fundraise in order to repay money to the 2012 IC convention Profit Fund and have additional monies to fund the future budgets. \$1,200.00 had to be moved from the 2012 IC Convention Profit Fund to the General Operating Fund Account for the 2021 budget.

Chapter Presidents will be getting detailed information in October on exciting opportunities to help fund the OK State Council.

Distinguished Achievement Award Chair, Rita Haines reminded us of the March 1st deadline for chapters to submit their candidate.

Sooner Seniorette President Nancy Baucom asked Mona to announce that she will email all Sooner Seniorettes by the end of the month.

New Business/ Announcements: September 30th is Chili's profit day for ESA. Deb Hughes asked that those who can't attend please consider donating to Team ESA Oklahoma for the St. Jude Walk/Run.

Other new Business- Brenda Yates announced an update to by laws is in the works with IC. Lee Ann Wray IC President is working on it. Make sure HQ has current ballot email address. Rosalie Griffith stated that language for ballot voting is being updated after board approval. Information will be sent out to states after board approval.



The Tulsa Area Council presented their slate of officers for 2021 via Zoom on Wednesday, November 4th.


