Stephanie Kwolek July 31, 1923 – June 18, 2014

Stephanie was an American chemist who is known for inventing Kevlar. She was of Polish heritage and her career at the DuPont Company spanned more than 40 years. She discovered the first of a family of synthetic fibers of exceptional strength and stiffness and polyparaphenylene terephthalamide.

In 1964 her group searched for a new lightweight strong fiber to use for light but strong tires. The polymers she had been working with of the time formed liquid crystal while in solution, something unique to those polymers at the time.

Stephanie was born to Polish immigrant parents in the Pittsburgh suburb of New Kensington, Pa. in 1923. Her father John died when she was 10 years old. He was a naturalist by avocation and she spent hours with him as a child exploring the natural world. She attributed her interest in science to him and an interest in fashion design to her mother, Nellie (Zydel) Kwolek who worked as a seamstress.

At young age, Kwolek considered a career in fashion but her mother warned her that she was too much of a perfectionist to be a designer. She did have a love of textiles and fiber arts. So, she chose chemistry a field for perfectionists if there ever was one. Stephanie received her bachelor's degree in chemistry in 1946 and was looking for a temporary job to help raise the money from medical school. But in the lab, she became fascinated by polymer chemistry and decided to stay.

1965 trying to replace the steel wire used in car tires developed a light strong fiber that could help improve car's gas mileage. A work day at the lab consisted mostly of dissolving long chains of molecules called polyamides-the same type of synthetic polymer used to make materials like nylon-and running the solution through a machine that would spin it into fiber. The molecules DuPont was working with melted at nearly 400 degrees to be spun and heating made the fiber too weak and floppy for the job. Kwolek job was to find a version that could be spun at lower temperatures. Even she was surprised when a batch of dissolved polyamides produced a milky, runny liquid solution instead of the clear, syrup thick solution she expected. But instead of throwing it out as a bad batch or rejecting that molecule as a non-starter decided to give the weird cloudy solution a try. The result was the strongest, stiffest fiber anyone had seen so far. Today we know it as Kevlar.

Kevlar works because, under the right conditions, the molecules arrange themselves end to end, parallel to the length of the fiber and form strong hydrogen bonds between the molecule chains. The resulting material is 5 times stronger than equal weight of steel but lighter than fiberglass and withstand high temps.

She had developed exactly the material her bosses were looking for, but it turned out that she'd done even more than that. Bulletproof vests and body armor made from Kevlar and related materials have saved the lives of thousands of armed services members, law enforcement officers. The material is also used in the boots that firefighter's wear, in spacecraft components, in the gloves that protect cook's fingers from kitchen knives and in skis, tennis rackets and ropes.

Stephanie spent next 20 years at DuPont who put her in charge of polymer research at its Pioneer lab. She retired in 1986 but continued to consult for them. She also served on committees for the National Academy of Science and the National Research Council.

1995 Stephanie was awarded the DuPont Company's Lavoisier Medal for Outstanding technical achievement. She died June 18, 2014. At the time of death she was still the only female employee to receive that honor. Other awards are National Medal of Technology and Innovation (1996) and Perkin Medal (1997). Nominations-Lemelson-MIT Lifetime Achievement Award (1999).

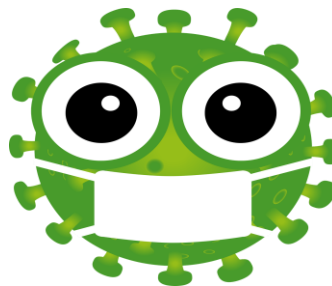
