

Leadership doesn't need to be taught in long drawn-out seminars but in small doses. Learning is a life-long process, not just in the classroom.

One of the joys of the position of State Educational Chair is the chance to see the books that you compile to celebrate your year of accomplishments. Not many individual chapter directors nominate themselves, but I want you to know that you should be proud of your year's accomplishments. Your Educational book should have a covered page, title page, and etc., go to www.oklaesa.org website for the complete form on what to include in your educational book. Remember the deadline is April I, the importance of doing this because whether or not it places as State, you will have a beautiful memory book to treasure.

Music That Changed the World, pt. I "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing"

The beginning of a three- part series we are going to look at some music that is considered worship music, church music, and that's the music and the hymns of Charles Wesley.

Charles Wesley probably had just as big of an impact as John in the Methodist Movement. His impact went further beyond the boundaries of Methodism than even John's did and that's because of his hymn writing. Charles Wesley was a prolific hymn writer. He was born as the 18th of 19 children into the Wesley family to Samuel and Susanna. Whenever he was growing- up he started from an early age to love poetry and writing and hymns. There's no doubt that he was influenced by his father and his oldest brother - Samuel Wesley, Sr., and Samuel Wesley, Jr., both of whom were hymn writers. Charles started writing poetry and hymns from an early age. As he got a bit older he would go to school with his brother John at Christ Church there at Oxford College and the two of them together - John and Charles - while there they started looking around at the Church of England and what was going on around them and what they saw was a real need for spiritual revival.

Charles Wesley made his impact so significantly through his hymn writing. Throughout his life Charles would write more than 9000 hymns and poems. He was a prolific writer. If one was to take all of Charles hymns and poems, every line, every stanza of all of his different hymns and poems it would have required writing more than IO lines of poetry a day for 50 years without taking a break in order to come with all the hymns and poems the he wrote. That's not counting the sermons, the letters and journals that he wrote. Wesley was a prolific writer and with his hymns is how the spread went far beyond Methodism and have impacted the church around the globe, hymns that you and I probably know about even if you didn't know that they were written by Charles, hymns like "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" "Hark the Herald Angels Sing", hymns like "Rejoice the Lord is King", "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "Oh Come Now Traveler Unknown". He wrote some incredible hymns.

Wesley was suffering a bout of pleurisy in May, 1738 while he and his brother were studying under the Moravian scholar Peter Baehler in London. At the time Wesley was plagued by extreme doubts about his faith. Based on Psalm 35:28 written in 1739 "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" was written by Wesley.

His hymn "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" is a hymn that has impacted Methodism, especially for centuries now. In every Methodist Hymn Book since 1780, the very first hymn to appear in the hymn book is "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing." If you were to go back in our hymn books what you'll find is that depending which hymnal you're looking you might find 4 or 5, maybe even up to 7 verses in the hymnal and when Wesley originally wrote the hymn he wrote 18 verses. This hymn began with the opening lines "Glory to God, and praise and love, be ever given; and was published in 1740 and entitled "For the Anniversary Day of One's Conversion". The 7th verse, which began "O For a Thousand Tongues, My great Redeemer's praise, the glories of my God and King, The triumphs of his grace! "now invariably is the Ist verse of a shorter hymn,

recalls Babler's word, "Had I a Thousand Tongues I would praise Him with them all." The hymn was Ist placed in John Wesley's "A Collection of Hymns for the People Called Methodists' published in 1780. It appeared in every Wesleyan Methodist hymnal from that time until the publication of Hymns and Psalms in 1983. Today the hymn is often condensed into a smaller number, typically 6 to 8 stanzas.

Wesley wanted to write this hymn not just for the anniversary of his own conversion, but for all of us to look back and remember those times we have felt close to God, to look back and be reminded of those times when we did trust in God's love because Wesley understood that we will all go through times in life.

The music to which we sing these words was composed by Lowell Mason in 1839. Mr. Mason was the Ist music teacher hired by an American public school.

Charles Wesley (1707-1788) was the greatest hymn writer in Methodist history, some of whom have attained first rank in English hymnology. He and his brother admitted that they have converted more through their hymns than through preaching. Wesley

usually celebrates each anniversary of his birthday by writing a hymn of praise to God. Little wonder, that Ist anniversary of his conversion, his spiritual birthday.

Thanks again to everyone who participated in any way with the Auction. A donation of 893.33 was sent through the Turnaround Fund for Easter Seals; St Jude and ESA Foundation couldn't be divided evenly because of the checks being written by different people. They have a new computer program and the checks are handled differently. They were divided as follows:

Hawkins/Tuma/Starr Memorial Endowment - \$976

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital Cancer Survivor Endowment - \$810.67

If you want individual tax credit for the auction donation, you will need to make out your checks to the ESA Foundation, but instead of sending in the checks as a donation made on behalf of the state council it would need to be noted that each check is an individual donation made by that person. This way, the Foundation records each check as if you had sent it to the Foundation yourself and then a receipt would be mailed to you showing you made the donation, and you would get the credit for the donation. The State Counselor or some one would need to decide which entity your donation would go to in order to have the donations divided as equally as possible. It is important to note that the council would not get credit for the donation, the person writing the check would, but all individual donations are counted towards the state's total at the end of the year.




If you arrive early in Wichita on Thursday, they have a list of fun stuff to do with your ESA friends.




