The Gold Link Award is just a matter of submitting six (6) timely programs to the State Educational Director. Report forms can be found at (www.oklaesa.org). Timely reports must be postmarked by the last day of the month following the month the program was presented.

The Gold Seal Entry is all the year's programs combined in a folder/notebook following the rules for the Gold Seal Award and submitting the book to the State Educational Directory no later than April 1.

The Distinguished Athenian Service Award is presented to the Chapter Educational Chairman who has gone beyond the call of duty in her service to the ESA educational field. You must submit a Gold Seal Entry to be eligible AND be nominated by your Chapter President.

**State Educational Special Award is presented to the chapter educational director who presented an educational program on this year's state theme

INVENTIONS THAT CHANGED THE WORLD

It's okay if you're skeptical about new innovations these days, with the way many products are marketed, it's hard to believe any one will actually change your life. But many successful inventions endured plenty of public ridicule becoming wildly popular. And today we can't live without them.

- **Light bulbs - Thomas Edison is revered by many school children as the father of invention. He was present at the invention of many things we use today, for which he filed lots of patents: 1,093 in the United States alone.**
- **Coffee - was the first popularly used by Sufi Muslims to stay away during their nighttime devotions. When the drink was introduced to the public in the Middle East, it was a miracle-people were finding more time in their day to create, discuss, and spread ideas. Today, coffee might be making our lives longer.**
- **Airplanes and fighter jets - the Wright Brothers made headlines when they flew the first airplane in 1903. The flight lasted for some 12 seconds.**
- **Umbrellas - the umbrella known as a waterproof, lightweight version of the more feminine parasol, had to shed its gendered associations. It took until the late 1700s for the umbrella to come into vogue.**
- **Personal computers - for a time, people feared computers. The 1996 book "Women and Computers" claimed women were afflicted with what it called computerphobia, a panoply of conditions that reflected a fear of touching or damaging the computer, and aversion to discussing or reading about it.. Aside from the outlandish fears, people also treated owning and using a personal computer the same way you'd learn an instrument - as a chore. Today, we're getting better and better at making computers more user friendly and intuitive.**
- **Taxis - in the early 1900s taxi cabs were hit or miss. Drivers could charge you whatever they wanted, so you couldn't really trust the person behind the wheel. Harry Allen, a 30 year old businessman, bought a fleet of 65 red French Darracq taxi cabs and hired a team of drivers. It was the first modern taxi fleet. Today, taxi cabs may get nearly 400,000 trips a day in New York, twice as many as Uber and Lyft combined.**
- **Vaccines - before anti-vaxxers, there were antivaccinationists, but their ideas and sentiments were basically the same. Anti- vaccinationists were mostly against the laws requiring immunizations. The debate around vaccinations continues today, though the practice is widely considered crucial to advancing public health.**
- **Internet - was first developed in 1973 by Vinton Cerf backed by the US Department of Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency. This invention, along with the World Wide Web, has been**

the foremost revolutionary invention of the 20th century. In 196, more than 25 millions computers were connected through the internet across 180 countries.

- **World Wide Web – as we know as first predicted by Arthur Clarke when he wrote that one day satellites would bring accumulated knowledge of the world to our fingertips, combining the telephone, photocopies, television and computer. However, the invention was made 19 years later in 1989 by a CERN employee, Tom Berners Lee. The web has transformed the way we work in various fields including education, music, finance, reading medicine, dating, networking, language and the like. The Web potentially trumps all the world's greatest inventions.**
- **Television – the invention of the television cannot be attributed to one person, it is largely believed that the invention of the modern television was the work of two people: Zworykin (1923) and Farnsworth (1927). The television was also one of the greatest inventions which has evolved from mechanical to electronic to color to digital to smart and now 3D versions. People typically spend around 4-8 hours watching TV per day and it has drastically impacted family and social life.**
- **Telephone – Alexander Graham Bell joined two cups with a thread at the bottom of both ends and used it to talk from one end and listen from the other. This laid the foundation work for another revolutionary invention that is today the attachment that we all carry in our hands or pockets. The telephone, also developed as a mobile phone has had a life-saving impact on mankind especially in the field of business and communication.**

Wichita, Kansas is the happening place for the annual MARC Conference on *Friday, Oct. 8 and Saturday, Oct. 9, 2021.*

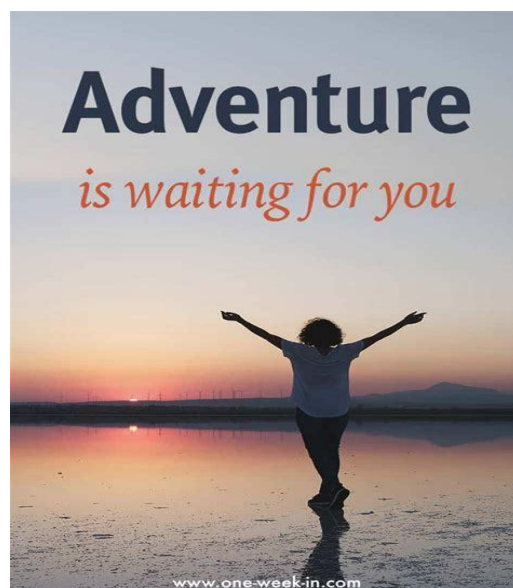

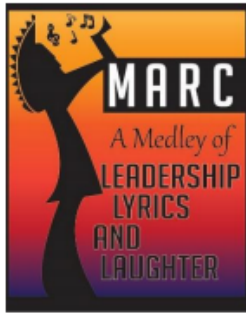
If you arrive early in Wichita on Thursday, they have a list of fun stuff to do with your ESA friends.

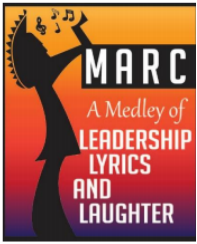

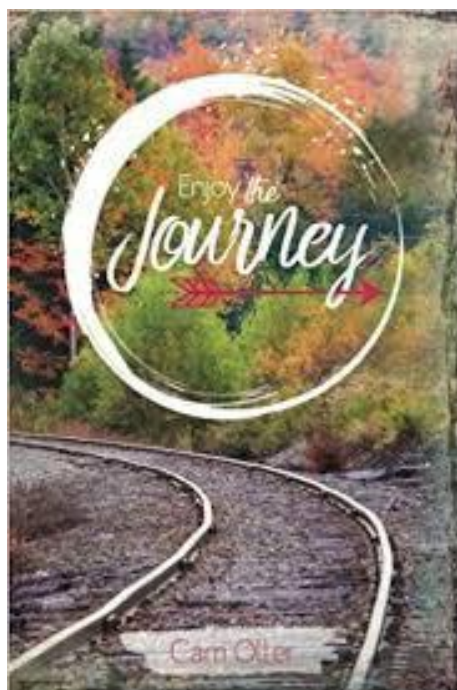

Gamma Delta Chatter.....

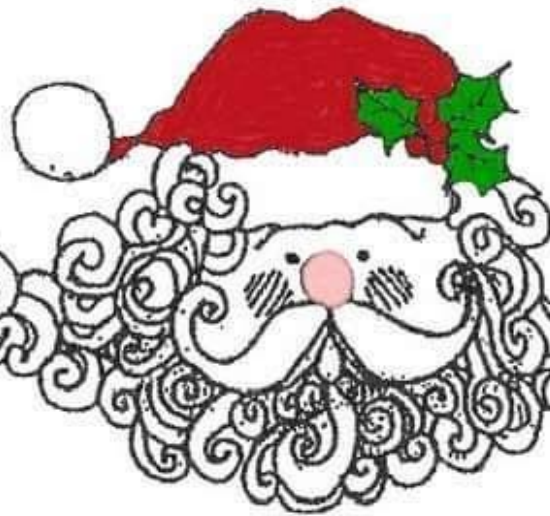

Gamma Zeta Chatter

Sergeant Bennes, a 12 year veteran from the Edmond Firefighters' Association, presented a safety education to Gamma Zeta service organization. Bennes gives interactive presentations and demonstrations to senior centers, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Mothers' Day Out groups, and to anyone interested in fire prevention. Edmond has a child safety village for children 4 - 7 years of age where kids can actually have a fun-filled, hands-on approach to his instruction.

Edmond has 5 fire stations with plans to add a 6th one. Currently 160 firemen are working around the clock and an additional 12 more hirings coming soon.

His topics were how to prevent preventable injuries with electricity and firearms, information on smoke detectors (which should be replaced every ten years), and carbon monoxide detectors. He also suggested cleaning dryer vents, freezer coils, and cleaning under and behind the refrigerator.

Bennes ended the evening by presenting a SAFETY WITH CHARLEY booklet which includes vital information with activities for children to learn about fire safety. It was an excellent presentation.
