I am thrilled to review your reports and wish I could personally attend each program. Several chapters have submitted at least four or more timely reports, so you are well on your way toward a Gold Link Award and I hope, completing your Gold Seal Entry too. Keep up the outstanding momentum ladies! However let me emphasize, every chapter in the state can do this. It is not too late to begin an educational program for your chapter. You still have time! Some chapters may have more than one program at a meeting, others may take a Saturday or Sunday and include several programs and still some chapters combine a social and an educational program in the same meeting. Don't forget, our educational programs are a great opportunity to invite prospective members to "get acquainted with ESA" too.

The idea behind my theme *'Indulge Yourself'* is to select something you have always wanted to do and involve your members. The door is wide open. Make it work for your chapter and be creative! Now it is time for additional chapter teamwork as we approach the second half of our state ESA year.

1. Chapter members, please encourage your educational director to submit at least six timely reports about your programs. This will make your chapter eligible for the Gold Link Award. All reports are due to me by April 1, 2008.

3. Chapter Educational Directors, you should be in the process of organizing your **Gold Seal Entry** for submission. This is a notebook compiling all of your chapter education programs for the year, a minimum of six timely reports. The deadline is April 1, 2008.

4. Chapter Presidents, if your chapter is in the process or completed the above requirements your chapter educational director is eligible to be nominated as Distinguished Athenian. You should **send me a letter to nominate her** by highlighting her outstanding contributions to her chapter, community and state council. The deadline is April 1, 2008.

5. Chapter Educational Directors, have at least one program on my theme, *'Indulge Yourself'* for a special award. I feel rather confident that most, if not all, of your programs will fit into this category, so everyone is a winner, members and chapters. However you do need to submit a timely report. The deadline is April 1, 2008.

## A Mini-Educational: "Let's Have A Tea Party" Deb Hughes-2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President & Educational Director

Interaction and active participation are two aspects that I wanted to include in the state educational program this year. Take the time to *"Indulge Yourself"* in something that you have always wanted to do or even re-do. Educational programs can be in the form of oral presentations, visual aids, hands-on demonstrations, guest speakers, tours, etc. If you need assistance preparing a special educational program for your chapter, please be sure to contact me.

At the November State Council meeting we had a mini hands-on demonstration making candy reindeers. As a follow-up, now that you have learned the sequence, you are able to be the leader to take it back to your chapter and show them the same. Here is another idea for a handson participation.

When you think of a tea party what first comes to your mind? I know many of our chapters host a "Rush Tea" and others perhaps a "Founder's Day Tea" but those have a different agenda. I am speaking of a *real tea party*, where each of you is the guest of an elegant period where you can rid yourself of that sinking feeling in the middle of the day, diminish the stress for a brief time, visit with each other, and indulge a tasty treat.

This program also has several options. You can have a tea party for a kindergarten class or a young class from your church and introduce them to an aspect of another era. On the other hand, you can host a tea party for a senior adult day care program too. I know of one group that has an elegant tea party each year near Mother's Day and the ladies just love it. Think outside the box for your planning.

Perhaps there is a local restaurant or tea room that you can schedule a visit which will lessen the planning, although you may wish to prepare a brief oral presentation to share at your tea party on the various types of tea. This could be on the tea itself or the difference between "high tea" and "low tea" times.

I know several years ago my chapter went to Bartlesville for "afternoon tea" complete with hats, gloves, finger sandwiches, sweet delicate desserts and of course, several types of tea. Our hostess even provided a program about the differences of teas. While we laughed at ourselves in the unusual hats we did have great fun, and felt quite pampered.

If you want to host the tea party yourself, have each guest bring her favorite tea cup and saucer. I bet a story will accompany each one which is a great opening for conversation, especially for your guests that might not know each other well. The hostess may want to pick up a few extra cups and saucers to have on hand in case some forget. I haven't been to a garage sale that doesn't have dozens of cups and saucers waiting for a tea party. And don't be surprised if you find teacups without handles. Early porcelain cups from China did not have handles and were quite small. The raising of the pinky finger was to offer balance in holding the cup with the thumb at six o'clock and the index and middle finger at twelve o'clock position. Etiquette protocol is to never loop your fingers through the handle nor hold the vessel bowl with the palm of your hand.

While you are there, pick up cloth napkins too. Give them a quick wash and swipe of an iron and they are ready to make an elegant entrance on your table. Don't worry if they don't match, let your creativity shine. Place the napkin to the left side of the place setting. The napkin should be folded with the closed edge to the left and the open edge to the right. There are no exceptions! This rule applies for rectangular, triangular, and square shape folds. Note: Less formal affairs may allow a fancy folded napkin to be placed in the center of the place setting.

Either provide a small fork or lemon fork for your guests, or have the tea server neatly place a slice in the tea cup after the tea has been poured. Be sure never to add lemon with milk since the lemon's citric acid will cause the proteins in the milk to curdle. By the way, milk is preferred over heavy cream as the cream will mask the taste of the tea. Some ladies will prefer to pour the milk in after the tea to get the right flavor, definitely an individual taste. Do not use your tea to wash down food. Sip, don't slurp, your tea and swallow before eating.

As for a tip, do not stir your tea, with your tea spoon, in sweeping circular motions. Place your tea spoon at the six o'clock position and softly fold the liquid towards the twelve o'clock position two or three times. Never leave your tea spoon in your tea cup. When not in use, place your tea spoon on the right side of the tea saucer. Never wave or hold your tea cup in the air. When not in use, place the tea cup back in the tea saucer.

As for recipes and types of tea to serve, the resource materials are abundant and easy to locate. Perhaps your own grandmother or great-grandmother had favorite recipes she passed along to you. Have fun experimenting with recipes. I have also provided links to a few websites for scrumptious recipes too!

Because it is usually taken in the late afternoon, "afternoon tea" is also called 'low tea'; it was usually taken in a sitting room where low tables such as a coffee table were placed near sofas or chairs. Three basic types of "afternoon or low tea" are 1. Cream Tea - Tea, scones, jam and cream 2. Light Tea - Tea, scones and sweets 3. Full Tea - Tea, savories, scones, sweets and dessert

In England, the traditional time for tea was four or five o'clock and no one stayed after seven o'clock. Most tea rooms today serve tea from three to five o'clock. The menu has also changed from tea, bread, butter and cakes, to include three particular courses served specifically in this order: 1. Savories - Tiny sandwiches or appetizers 2. Scones - Served with jam and Devonshire or clotted cream 3. Pastries - Cakes, cookies, shortbread and sweets

"High Tea" or "meat tea" is really dinner. Most people refer to "afternoon tea" as "high tea" because they think it sounds regal and lofty. "High tea" in England tends to be on the heavier side. American hotels and tea rooms tend to offer tidbits of fancy pastries and cakes on delicate china when they offer a 'high tea.'

Here are a few tidbits about the early history of tea time. Afternoon tea may have been started by the French in Paris in 1636, some 22 years before England accepted the practice. According to legend, the practice of drinking tea was extremely popular with the aristocracy. In an early gossip newspaper it was noted that society Madams took 12 or more cups of tea each morning and it cured their ails, so naturally others soon followed the practice too. One such Madame took her tea with milk and the English immediately adopted this French touch and even touted it as their own.

In the mid 1600's England's Queen Elizabeth I granted permission to open trade routes from India, Far East, and Southwest Asia. While the original focus was spices, by the 1670's traders included cottons, silks, indigo, saltpeter and tea. England's King Charles II further opened the tea trade with his acceptance of his bride's dowry of direct trading ports. King Charles and his wife, Catherine, were confirmed tea drinkers and when they re-established the monarchy in England, they brought the foreign tea influence with them, especially among the wealthier society. Soon everyone began copying the royal tradition and tea became the beverage of choice, replacing ale as the breakfast drink.

Prior to the introduction of tea, the English had two main meals, breakfast and dinner. Breakfast

Mary Ann Jones 536 N. Beard Shawnee 74801 was ale, bread, and beef. Sometime during the middle of the eighteenth century, dinner for the upper and middle classes shifted from noontime to an evening meal and became long and massive as it was served at a fashionable late hour.

It was during the Industrial Revolution, the later portion of the Victorian period, that working families brought the dining custom to another level. When they returned home exhausted from a hard day's work their table would be set with meats, bread, butter, pickles, cheese and of course tea. Because the meal was eaten at a high, dining table rather than the low tea tables, it was termed "high tea". Note the absence of the dainty finger sandwiches, scones and pastries of the society afternoon tea.

According to legend, the Duchess of Bedford also known as Anna Maria Stanhope, a lady-inwaiting for England's Queen Victoria is credited with afternoon teatime. As the noon meal became skimpier, the Duchess began to get a "sinking feeling" about four o'clock in the afternoon, and she would have her servants sneak her a pot of tea and a few pieces of bread to hold her until the dinner serving. She soon adopted the European tea service format for this afternoon meal about five o'clock. The menu expanded to include small cakes, bread and butter sandwiches, assorted sweets and of course, the pot of tea.

The practice grew so popular that when she returned to London following her summer visits to the countryside she began inviting friends to join her for "tea and a walk in the gardens". And naturally because the royals did it, the practice was quickly adopted by other social hostesses.

Okay now you have your tea cups and saucers and the recipes are ready for the tasting. Okay now you have your tea cups and saucers and the recipes are ready for the tasting. I think a tea party would be a great way to pass a cold winter afternoon. By the way, while sharing a tea party with others is enjoyable, setting aside a time for a tea party for one, you, is also a great pick-me-up idea. Ladies, let's have tea!
