

2nd Vice President, Peggy Sprinkle continued

Paul Harvey Aurandt (September 4, 1918 – February 28, 2009), better known as **Paul Harvey**, was a conservative American [radio broadcaster](#) for the [ABC](#) Radio Networks. He broadcast *News and Comment* on weekday mornings and mid-days, and at noon on Saturdays, as well as his famous [The Rest of the Story](#) segments. From the 1950s through the 1990s, Harvey's programs reached as many as 24 million people a week. *Paul Harvey News* was carried on 1,200 radio stations, 400 [Armed Forces Network](#) stations and 300 newspapers.

Harvey was born in Tulsa, Oklahoma. He attended [Tulsa Central High School](#) where a teacher, Isabelle Ronan, was "impressed by his voice." On her recommendation, he started working at [KVOO](#) in Tulsa in 1933, when he was 14. His first job was helping clean up. Eventually he was allowed to fill in on the air, reading commercials and the news. While attending the [University of Tulsa](#), he continued working at KVOO, first as an announcer, and later as a program director. Harvey, at age nineteen spent three years as a station manager for KFBI AM, now known as KFDI, a radio station that once had studios in [Salina, Kansas](#). From there, he moved to a newscasting job at [KOMA](#) in [Oklahoma City](#).

In the latter half of his career, Harvey was also known for the radio series *The Rest of the Story*, described as a blend of mystery and history, which premiered on May 10, 1976. The series quickly grew to six broadcasts a week, and continued until Harvey's death in 2009. *The Rest of the Story* series was written and produced by the broadcaster's son, Paul Harvey, Jr., from its outset and for its thirty-three year duration. Harvey and his radio network stated that the stories in that series, although entertaining, were completely true.

ESA FOR ST. JUDE

ESA introduced a campaign in the spring called “Push to 200 Million.” The goal was to encourage chapters to hold an additional spring event benefiting St. Jude to ensure that ESA would reach the 200 million lifetime donation. Three Oklahoma Chapters participated in this campaign. Thank you to Beta Mu, Lawton; Beta Psi, Clinton; and Kappa Alpha, Tulsa. ESA’s total lifetime donation to St. Jude since 1972 is \$208,481,968. ESA made history by “reaching the milestone of more than 200 million for St. Jude, and the Jonquil notes that “the total for the 2014-15 year was the highest single year donation in ESA and St. Jude history.”

The fall was especially rewarding as OK City and Tulsa ESA members helped to sponsor the St. Jude Walk/Run to End Childhood Cancer. OK City held their walk at the Zoo, had over 400 participants, and have raised \$50,029.00. Tulsa’s Walk/Run was held in Stone Canyon and had great representation from NE OK with 35 ESA volunteers assisting and participating in the event. Tulsa raised \$89,101.16 and those campaigns are still open until December 1. The total for OK presently is \$139,130.16 and climbing. Great Job.

And, on a beautiful fall afternoon, Barbara and I had the pleasure of participating in the groundbreaking in Stone Canyon for the 2016 St. Jude Dream Home. Jeff Starkweather and Kirk Murdoch of Epic Custom Homes have once again volunteered to build another beautiful Dream Home for St. Jude. Stone Canyon in Owasso has generously donated a \$75,000 lot for our Dream Home. Epic Custom Homes and Stone Canyon...great sponsors.

Many of our OK ESA members are participating in the December 5th St. Jude Memphis Marathon. I know they would appreciate our sponsorship and support.



According to Wikipedia... "Social media has been broadly defined to refer to 'the many relatively inexpensive and widely accessible electronic tools that enable anyone to publish and access information, collaborate on a common effort, or build relationships'".

In the book “Networked – The new social operating system” by Lee Rainie and Barry Wellman, social media are used to form friendships. 


Our year, led by President, Hali Simmons, is full of more fun--please stay tuned for the details. Yay!
