STATE DISASTER FUND CHAIR DONATION FORM PROCEDURES

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE DISASTER FUND

All checks are to be made payable to the **ESA Disaster Fund** and mailed to the State Disaster Fund Chair. If the State Disaster Fund Chair receives a cash donation, it should be deposited, and a personal check or money order made out to the IC Disaster Fund should then be completed and sent to the IC Disaster Fund Chair. If there is no state council, contributions may be mailed directly to the IC Disaster Fund Chair.

The duties of the State Disaster Fund Chair are two-fold:

- I. Promote the ESA International Council Disaster Fund and remind members that no one knows when they may need financial assistance. Disaster Fund proceeds cannot be administered without donations.
- II. Receive and process Disaster Fund donations from the membership and send them to the ESA International Council Disaster Fund Chair.
- III. MAIL CHAPTER DONATIONS FOR OKLAHOMA TO: Sandy Lackey 33794 E 743 Way Wagoner OK 74467 Jr Past Oklahoma State President 2022-2023 I will then record them and mail onto the IC Jr Past President.

I. DONATIONS

- **A. Promotion:** The State Chair is to promote the Disaster Fund within their state, reminding members that it can never be anticipated when disaster money may be needed. Disaster Fund promotions include special projects such as games of chance at state meetings, Memorial or Honorarium donations, contributions in lieu of Christmas, Birthday, Secret Pal gifts, etc.
- **B.** Chapter and Individual Donations: All checks are to be made payable to the ESA Disaster Fund and mailed to the State Disaster Fund Chair. If the State Disaster Fund Chair receives a cash donation, it should be deposited, and a personal check or money order made out to the ESA Disaster Fund should then be completed and sent to the IC Disaster Fund Chair. If there is no state council,
- **C. State Record Keeping:** Donations are to be recorded as the State Disaster Fund Chair receives them. The State Disaster Fund Chair may set up books/records to fit their needs for accurate, efficient reporting to the IC Disaster Fund Chair that will include the following:

Preparation of Disaster Fund Report and transfer of funds to the IC Disaster Fund Chair monthly.

The annual period to be covered is **June 1 through May 31**. An annual award will be given at IC Convention to the state that contributes the most

- 1. award will be given at IC Convention to the state that contributes the most dollars from June 1 through May 31. (See the section on Awards.)
 - i. This timeline is <u>NOT</u> the same as the International Council ESA year which is August 1 to July 31. The ESA International Council Disaster Fund Chair will receive donations submitted **after May 31** however, the monies will be deposited and count as donations for the following year.

II. DONATION FORM COMPLETION

- A. IMPORTANT: Complete a Donation Form with the State Council name, Report # 1, etc. and then list <u>all chapters</u> in the state including the chapter name and chapter number.
- **B.** Once a month, if donations are received, complete the Report Form. Simply record the donations on the lines for each chapter. If an individual donates, record that information after the list of chapters. If no donations are received during a month, no report is required.
 - 1. Completion of the Report Form provides a reference as to whether a chapter has donated as well as allows an accumulation of a chapter's total when more than one donation is submitted during the year.
 - **2.** The Donation Report Form is created in Excel; therefore, it is not necessary to insert a dollar sign for each donation.
 - **3.** The form should automatically calculate the total amount donated.
- C. Make sure the first report that is completed says **Report #1**.
 - 1. From the list created in Step A, find the name of the chapter that donated and enter the check number.
 - 2. Next, enter the donation amount in the Amount Contributed This Report column.
 - 3. Enter 0 (zero) in this column for chapters that did not donate for this report.
- **D.** For the next monthly report, begin by using **Report #1** and save it as **Report #2**.
 - 1. In the **Report #** space, change the Report # from 1 to 2.
 - 2. All the previous donations are listed, so now copy that amount to the Amt

Enter 0 (zero) in this column for all chapters that have not previously donated for this report.

WAYLAN'S KU KU BURGER

Waylan's Ku Ku Burger is a nostalgic burger joint located off Historic Route 66 in Miami, Oklahoma, which has been serving mouthwatering burgers since the 1960's. Once you order, you will see just how juicy and delicious their cooked-to-order burgers are. Be sure you order hot and crispy fries and a shake or ice-cream cone to go with your burger.

The interior is uniquely decorated with nostalgic Route 66 memorabilia. It started as a fast-food chain in the 1960's and this location is the only one still standing. It features a drive-in as well. It is also famous for its giant yellow fiberglass cuckoo bird emerging from the front wall and a huge, green, and yellow neon sign, located at 915 N. Main.

HAMMET HOUSE

CLAREMORE, OK

Mr. and Mrs. James R. May were personal friends of the Hammett's. James truly enjoyed food. He was a huge fan of dining out, if he was served quality food with excellent service. As a restauranteur, he had plenty of experience in how to provide both and was pleased when the favor was returned. Mrs. May worked at the Hammett House which was still owned by the Hammett family. She served drinks to

the business crowds. The restaurant was a dark, cozy joint, paneled in deep walnut imposing red leather booths. Behind the restaurant stands a nearby building that serves as a bakery. Mrs. May worked early morning shifts making delicious, fluffy, made-from scratch rolls that the Hammett House proudly serves today.

The May's were good friends with the Hammett's and often they would eat there, because they served quality food with excellent service. The other restaurant that the May's frequented was the Golden Corral. This was a time of placing your order at a counter and being seated, with your food brought to you. It had a salad bar and no guard shields.

They ate several times a week at the Golden Corral. James' good friend Bill Biard worked there for years. He was the restaurants partner and manager. In the meantime, the Hammett House closed, and the building sat vacant for about five years.

In 1991, Bill Biard of Golden Corral, and his wife, Linda purchased the empty restaurant. He was torn about the decision, after 20 years of corporate restaurant experience and his career with Golden Corral if it should

be called Bill's Steakhouse or something entirely different. In the meantime, Jim Hammett approached Bill looking for a job. With a gifted cook and an original Hammett on the team, Bill and Linda recreated the Hammett House of its heyday.

Hammett House first opened in April 1969, a dream of LaNelle Hammett. She was the matriarch of the Hammett clan. LaNelle loved to cook and was full of creative and innovative ideas. She was also declared legally blind at the age of 19, but that did not stop her from baking homemade rolls and the made-from-scratch pies that put Hammett House on the map.

LaNelle was one of the first to get involved with Weight Watchers and serve healthy choices to patrons. She invented her "Skinny Soup" in 1970, and it is still a staple on the menu today. Another popular choice still on the menu is the Lemon Pecan Pie. She discovered this in an issue of Southern Living in the 1960's. Some out-standing items on the menu include Pamper Fried Chicken and Matzo Ball Soup, made with her signature seasonings.

The salad dressings are another item not to be missed. One was called the "Pink Stuff". It is cold, garlicky, and pink, and recalls the "Love Dip" at Central Market in Texas. Bill eventually purchased the recipe from Joe Littlefield. He learned then that the recipe was first discovered at the Pryor Café. During Bill's tenure, he has also concocted the "Green Stuff" which is Cilantro Lime Ranch.

The historical restaurant stays true to its roots in the daily potluck specials. Each day, a lunch special is served, and it does not vary. The Navy bean soup has been served on Wednesdays for years and years. On Sundays, the matzo ball soup is served.

The pies made from scratch caught the attention of more than local diners or travelers. Southern Living even published an article dedicated to the delectable desserts. One of Bill's additions is the Apple Pie Delight, which is served on a hot cast iron skillet and drizzled with brandy-butter sauce. Ice cream is often served on top as well. Hammett House also serves Trisha Yearwood's Key Lime Cake, with Trisha's blessing

Some facts: The Chocolate Chip Peanut Butter pie weighs 13 pounds. Approximately 38% of the customer's order desserts. They are to-go dessert business is over-whelming.

It has been in business for more than 40 years and strive to continue good service and tasty food.

The International Council (IC) of ESA shall select the Outstanding Senior High Youth based upon the following criteria:

Scholastic Ability

The applicant shall be a senior high student who meets the academic qualification: Have a minimum 3.0 GPA on a 4.0 Grade Scale The applicant shall provide a copy of the most recent to verify grades.

Character and Leadership Skills

The applicant shall provide the judging committee with two (2) letters of recommendation. At least one recommendation shall be from a teacher or school official. Recommendations shall not be submitted from members of the applicant's family. Recommendations should be originals of recent (current) year.

The applicant shall provide a personal essay. The essay topic shall be, "What is the definition of an outstanding individual and how do I personally meet this definition?" There is no specified length requirement; however, typewritten essays are preferred. The essay must be an original, which is signed and dated by the applicant.

Rules and Regulations The winner of the Outstanding Senior High Youth Award will be chosen annually. A person may receive this award only **one** time. A person may apply for this award as many times as they wish as long as they meet the criteria. No special consideration will be given to an applicant who makes a second or third entry for this award.

The deadline for submitting applications will be **March 1**st and must be sent to the International Council Youth Award Chair by the specified date. **All necessary information must be included with the application form at that time.**

The applicant must apply for this award to his/her individual State ESA Youth Award Chair. (If no State Chair directly to the IC Awards Chair.). The application with all attachments, if approved, will be forwarded to the International Council Awards Chair and committee for approval and judging.

A letter will be sent to the winner (only) after judging has been completed and no later than May 15th.

The State Council Meeting was called to order by President, Linda Jones, at approximately 10:55 a.m., with the Opening Ritual. The Flag Salute and Pledge of Allegiance was led by Chaplain, Peggie Sprinkle.

Chaplain, Peggie gave her thought for the day. She spoke about being a blessing to others, in any way a person could.

President, Linda introduced the Executive and General Board. She thanked everyone who accepted her challenge to serve on the State Council Executive/General Board. She recognized the Sooner Seniorettes with a gift of appreciation, for their service to ESA. Delta Kappa will provide a "picnic" lunch. There was one First Time Attendee.

Corresponding Secretary, Eileen Wiley read regrets.

Kay Brader, Chair of the Committee to Read the Minutes, from the Oklahoma 79th State Convention, reported the minutes were placed on file as corrected. Linda reminded members to sign in on the attendance sheet, because Recording Secretary, Darla Barton would take roll call from those sheets.

Secretary Darla reminded members to give a copy of their report to her for the minutes.

President Linda announced The Committee to Read the Minutes for today's meeting would be Chair, Jacque Cantrel, along with Darlene Cushenberry and Liz King.

Sandy Lackey, standing in for 2022 Convention Chair, Elise Jimison, thanked those that helped raise money to incur some of the cost, leading to the income of \$18,054.50. Hotel and food expense was \$11,097.13; fund raising and miscellaneous expense of \$1,507.84; \$1,075.50 repayment of the loan from the

OK State Council, leaving an ending balance of \$4,374.03. Sandy split the profit as follows: \$2,184.00 to the State Council; hostess chapters, Beta Gamma, Kappa Alpha and Alpha Theta each received a check in the amount of \$730.01. All checks had cleared the bank. The account was closed.

Treasurer, Jennifer Sparkman gave the Treasure's report. She reported the general fund balance as of May 31, 2022, was \$3,370.49; income \$2,357.50, with an ending balance of \$5,727.99. The CD remains at \$4,000. The Money Market checking account balance was \$6,333.93. Jennifer moved the budget be approved as presented. President Linda explained the only increase added to the budget was \$50.00 for scrapbook and a few other items were raised \$10. With the motion to accept the budget, coming from a committee, no second was required. A vote was taken; motion carried.

State Project Director, Liz King reported that she was able to give gift cards in the amount of \$50.00 to the seniors, of each school; three students from the School for the Deaf and ten students from the School for the Blind. She reported that a tour of the School for the Deaf was tentatively scheduled for October 29, 2022. The hope was that there would be interaction with the students. Liz reported there were 87 students at OSB and 110 students at OSD. Money allocated to OSB was \$4,765.66; OSD \$5,494.50. The remaining balance in the account was \$49.35.

Vice President, Patty Heer introduced the nominating committee; Sandy Lackey, Linda Leveridge, Jacci Gantz, Brenda Yates and Dawn Haley. Patti encouraged members to ask questions and seek a board position for the 2023-2024 year. She said she would have contact information in the next Petticoat Journal.

Petticoat Journal Chair, Charlene Law reported the PJ Deadline dates as follows: 2022; July 5th, September 5th, November 5th. 2023; January 5th and March 5th. She asked that the articles be received as timely as possible and entries to be kept to half a page, with only two photos. The cost of mailing would remain at \$30. Charlene read the names of those that had paid and listed those that had not. She asked if anyone else wished to receive copies, they were to notify her.

2023 Convention Chair, Judi York reported that she had made the following recommendations at the Executive Board meeting, and they had approved an increase in the Convention registration fees. The Council would need to vote on

the proposal, as well. The recommendations were as follows: full registration raised from \$125.00 to \$135.00; men/guest registration from \$80.00 to \$90.00; banquet guest registration from \$55.00 to \$65.00. There was no discussion. Coming from a committee, no second was required. A vote was taken. Motion passed.

Acting Contest Chair, Margaret Kramer reported that the only business to handle was making small changes to the Service Report and contest requirements. Cheryl Tarter had stepped down from her position, as Contest Chair, due to the unexpected passing of her husband. Ramona Bench and Tammy Ramirez stepped in to take her place.

Directory Chair, Gina Wozencraft reported that 80 Directories had been printed. 67 were paid for. The remaining were available for purchase.

Web Master, Aletha Bolt asked for questions about the website or emails. She reminded members that each chapter and office have an email address to use.

Membership Chair, Sylvia Ochs, reported that she had received the membership stats from Headquarters. The report showed 49 ESA chapters in Oklahoma. There were 8 demits; no new pledges; one transfer in; one transfer out; 3 reinstatements, with a total of 512 active members.

Easter District Coordinator, Darlene Cushenberry introduced the Board for Eastern District; Vice Coordinator, Dawn Haley; Secretary, Sharon Barnett; Treasurer, Charlene Law; Parliamentarian, Deb Hughes. Darlene invited the Council to Eastern District's meeting August 27, 2022, at Highland Park Christian Church in Tulsa. Meeting to begin 10:00 a.m.

Western District Coordinator, Linda Leveridge announced the Western District meeting would be September 17, 2022, at Goodrich United Methodist Church, in Norman.

Educational Director, Jacque Cantrel announced her theme was "Route 66 Diners/Drive-In's East to West Coast." She said that Rt 66 covers eight states, beginning in Chicago, Illinois and ending in Santa Monica, California. She provided copies from diners and drive ins in IL and will feature the state of Missouri in the July PJ.

Easter Seals Chair, Maxine Wheelan received one check and will apply it where it needs to go.

President Linda reminded members to turn in Philanthropic reports to their chapter chairs.

Outstanding Chapter Chair, Peggy Campbell reminded everyone to send in the information when meetings are attended.
